

WHERE MONTRÉAL BEGAN

Who were the first Montréalistes?

Historians have long sought to identify all the first Montrealers, who at the time were also called Montréalistes. Knowledge available today allows us to say that 49 men and women left France in 1641 and were there on the point on May 17, 1642, when Montréal was founded, along with the authorities and notables come from Québec for the event. We know the following names.

The founders

Paul de Chomedey de Maisonneuve (1612–1676), Neuville-sur-Vanne (Champagne), military officer, founder and Governor of Montréal, age 30

Jeanne Mance (1606–1673), Langres (Champagne), founder and administrator of Montréal and the Hôtel-Dieu, caregiver, age 36

The first Montréal family: the Gadois-Godé family, Igé (Normandy)

Nicolas Godé (c. 1589–1657), master joiner, age 53

Françoise Gadois (c. 1593–1689), age 49

François Godé (1621–1658), master joiner, age 21

Françoise Godé (1626–1715), age 16

Nicolas Godé (1629–1697), master carpenter, age 13

Mathurine Godé (1637–1672), age 5

Bernard Berté (?–1643), Lyon (Rhône), labourer

Guillaume Boissier (c. 1608–1643), Limoges (Limousin), carpenter, age 34

Jacques Boni, Auvergne, labourer

Jean Caillot (1618–?), Lyon (Rhône), baker, age 24

Pierre Didier, France, labourer

Jacques Haudebert, Orléans (?), labourer

Augustin Hébert (c. 1620–1653), Caen (Normandy), master mason and stonemason, age 22

Pierre Laforest (?–1643), Auvergne, mason and stonemason

Pierre Laimery (c. 1607–?), Le Havre (Normandy), sailor, age 35

David de La Touze, labourer

Catherine Lezeau (1613–1684), Marans (Charente-Maritime), caregiver and Jeanne Mance's companion, age 29

Pierre Néret, France, labourer

Jean Philippes, France, labourer

Jean Poppé, France, surgeon

Jean Robelin (1607–?), Paris, mason, age 35
